Home School work and communication

I am very grateful to the teachers who have worked tirelessly responding to all your lovely emails and messages over these two weeks. They have been so impressed with how hard you are all working and you have made them smile with your positive and creative ways of tackling your learning. We plan to give you all a break over the Easter holidays, but we will still be thinking of you and look forward to resuming email contact again (or seeing you if we are open) from Tuesday 21st April. (Monday 20th is an INSET day and the staff will be completing a day's online training). The office emails will still be checked every few days so if you need support before the 21st, please use that email address to contact us.

We await news from the government about the status of schools after the Easter break, but if the situation continues and we remain closed we are changing our procedures a little. From the summer term, for the period of time we remain closed our expectations will be as follows:

- Parents/ children please email work to the class email address twice a week (but do ask questions in between should you need to).
- Staff will aim to respond to work twice a week and to queries as they arise.
- Staff will phone and/ or send follow up emails to families they haven't heard from during the week.
- Work coming home will be more project based with additional maths and SPAG (PiXL)

Hopefully, this will become more manageable for both teachers and families; we will continue to review.

In addition, Mrs Davey is hopeful that she will be able to set up all children on Nesy's digital learning platform over the Easter holidays so the children have another program they can use at home to continue their learning for phonics, reading, spelling and writing. Please email the office to let us know if you **do not** want your child to be included in this by Monday 6th April.

The DECP published advice on how to talk to children about coronavirus. Their advice is summarised as:

- Be truthful but remember your child's age.
- Allow children to ask questions.
- Try to manage your own worries.
- Give practical guidance e.g. how to wash your hands

I urge you to stick to age limit rules for individual gaming and social media sites and to be involved with your child's online life as much as possible.
