Units 1-6	 words containing the letter string ough (pronounced different ways) eg: enough, plough, doughnut, thoroughly common words that adults find difficult to spell eg: communicate, harass, occur, occupy homophones and other words often confused eg: principle/principal, weary/wary, proceed/precede doubled consonants where a suffix has been added eg: admittance, beginning, referring the sh sound spelt ti or ci eg: direction, delicious, ancient
Units 7-14	 silent letters eg: calm, autumn, knee, solemn, whistle spelling ie/ei (i before e except after c) eg: perceive, niece, achieve hyphens to attach a prefix to a root word eg: co-operate, re-enter words ending in -ible and -able eg: terrible, reliable, responsible, possibly common mistakes eg: it's/its, your/you're, whose/who's plural nouns eg: bonusbonuses, dictionarydictionaries, potatopotatoes, loafloaves confusing near homophone nouns and verbs eg: advice(noun)/advise (verb), licence (noun)/license (verb)
