Safety before and after School

Our school is situated next to, at times, a very busy road. Please ensure your child is supervised at all times during drop off and pick up, including younger siblings, especially down the alleyway towards the main road.

Also, please do not let any children in your care climb any of the school fences while you are waiting. Thank you

Medicines

School can administer prescribed medicine that needs to be given four times a day. It must have the pharmacy dispensing label on it with your child's name and a form needs to be completed. Lip salve, hand cream or any other ointments are not allowed to be carried by children in pockets or in book bags due to allergy reasons.



School Uniform

Children should wear full school uniform, including a school tie and school jumper/cardigan. All children should have a PE kit in school at all times. Nail varnish should not be worn and long hair needs to be tied back please with a simple band. Coloured hair is not allowed.

Book Bags

Children only need to bring their book bag to school with no more than one keyring attached please, as they are barely fitting into the drawers or boxes. Also, one keyring makes it easier for children to recognise their own book bag. Some book bags have more than ten attached to them! Toys, pencils and pencil cases should not be brought to school. *Once children are in Year 6 they can bring in their own rucksacks and pencil cases to prepare them for secondary school and to make them more independent.*



Our School Community

From September we have been following a new PSHE (Personal, Social and Health Education) scheme as a school called Jigsaw. It is described as 'the mindful approach to PSHE'. As well as covering the statutory requirements for PSHE and Relationships Education (RSE), Jigsaw also covers a range of other topics to help our children develop vital skills and knowledge to keep them safe, happy and healthy in their daily lives.
