<u>Headline</u> – usually only four or five words. It tries to attract the interest of the reader by telling them what the story is about, in a short and interesting way.

By-line – who wrote the article.

<u>Introduction</u> – It will set the scene and summarise the main points of the article: who, what, when, where.

Body – provides more detail about the event, in particular it answers the questions how and why.

Quotes – sometimes articles will include what a person (like an eye-witness or an expert) has said. These will be in speech marks.

<u>Photograph and caption</u> – sometimes articles have a photograph, and a sentence explaining the photograph.
