- To provide you with updates about RWI and changes we are making this year





Why RWI phonics?

- In our school we use the Read Write Inc. Phonics programme. This is a national programme we find the children enjoy.
- Children learn to read sounds and blend them into words. They apply this phonic knowledge to read and comprehend Storybooks that are carefully matched to the sounds they know.
- Children learn to read these books with a storyteller's voice.

Teach to the group's challenge level.


Re-assess all children every half term.

Sounds (graphemes)




Phonics is all about learning new sounds (both singular and special friends) and blending them together to read words.




Speed Sounds Set 1

Consonant sounds - stretchy




Consonant sounds - bouncy




Vowel sounds - bouncy

Vowel sounds - stretchy



Structure of every phonics lesson

- 1. Speed sounds with a sound of the day
 - 2. Reading
 - 3. Writing



Green Words

- During your 'speed sound' part of the lesson you will look at green and alien words.
- Green words involve children finding their special friends (if any) and then blending the sounds together to say the word.

3 methods of reading words

They will be able to read hundreds of words using the following 3 methods;


- 1. Blending them aloud (Fred talk)
- 2. Blending quickly and silently as blending and sounding is routine (Fred in your head)
- 3. Automatically reading familiar words (including red words)






Alien Words

Words that children can use their decoding skills to word out but the words itself don't make sense.

Early Readers

If your child is in Windmills they will be currently going through the baseline assessment. This will help teachers to assess any prior knowledge.

Windmills will be learning their set 1 sounds altogether from next week. Once all set 1 sounds have been taught the children will be assessed using the online assessment.




What book will my child bring home?

All children will start with a book with Storytelling book (a book with no words). After this, your child will bring home three different books each week.


- 1. The same book that they are reading in their RWI lesson
- 2. A Book bag book which is matched to their colour band
- 3. A library book

How can you help at home?

- 1. Use pure sounds rather than letter names.
- 2. Use Fred Talk to help your child to read and spell words.
- 3. Listen to your child read their Storybook every day.
- 4. Watch the Virtual Classroom films together (QR code)
- 5. Read stories to your child every day.
- 6. When you child has spellings as part of their homework, teach them how to spell using Fred fingers.

 Read With the spellings as part of their homework, teach them how to spell using Fred with the spellings as part of their homework.

Three reads

1. Read every word accurately.

2. Read more words 'at a glance'.

3. Read the whole story accurately, fluently and with a **storyteller's voice**.

All books in EYFS and KS1 will be changed on a Monday ReadW

Phonics Assessment



- The screening takes place in the Summer Term (June) for all Year 1 children
- During the check your child will be asked to read a list of 40 words to check their grapheme recognition and decoding skills. The word are made up of 20 real words and 20 alien words that they must read to teacher



- The check will normally be administered by a familiar adult in a familiar environment and usually take less than 10 minutes. We will try and keep as low key as possible, despite being a test.
- Each the score that children need to achieve in order to pass the screening isn't announced until after the check has been administered. For the past several years though the pass score has remained 32/40.
- If you child does not meet the pass mark, they will have the opportunity to retake the screening check in Year 2.



Changes we have made

- Book changing will now happen every Monday morning in all EYFS/KS1 classes
- Reading at home is a celebration of what they have learnt at school.
- Re-assessed all children in EYFS/KS1 using the online portal which groups them based on what sounds they know
- Ordered new materials to support teaching of phonics in school and to support your reading at home

Never read to - 4,622 words

1-2 times a week - 63,570 words

3-5 times a week - 169,520 words

Daily - 296,600 words

Five books a day - 1,483,300 words




