Hawridge and Cholesbury Church of England School Sport Premium Report – 2025-2026

The Primary School PE & Sport Premium funding was launched by the government in April 2013 and has recently been renewed through to 2025. It is ring-fenced additional funding to be used solely to achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools. It is important to emphasise that the focus of spending must lead to long lasting impact against the national vision (below) that will live on well beyond the Primary PE and Sport Premium funding period.

The *School Sport and Activity Action Plan* (H M Government, 2019) explain that ‘a positive experience of sport and physical activity at a young age and build a lifetime habit of participation and is central to meeting the Government’s ambitions for a world-class education system. Physical literacy (building physical competency alongside confidence, enjoyment, knowledge and understanding) and high quality, modern physical education (PE) lessons that engage boys and girls of different backgrounds and abilities should be a fundamental part of every child’s school experience.’ The Primary School PE & Sport Premium is viewed as being a vital part of this plan.

One Hawridge and Cholesbury Church of England Year 5 Pupil said “PE is really important in school as it gives us a chance to move and take part in new games. My favourite time of the week is PE.”

In academic year 2025/26, we have received £17,560.00. Having consulted with pupils and parents and to support our wider vision and plans for PE and sport we have spent the following:



Swimming

At Hawridge and Cholesbury CE School children in Year 3 and Year 4 have weekly swimming lessons for a term. We aim to invite any child who has not reached the below criteria to attend further swimming lessons so that all pupils at the end of Key Stage 2 are confident and safe swimmers.

Upskilling staff to deliver swimming lessons (£185.00)	Enhanced service delivery by staff being better equipped to teach safely and effectively. Higher quality lessons lead to improved learner outcomes. More consistent instructions across sessions results in more successful outcomes of pupils. Increased confidence in pupils where they are beginning to express their ideas. Teachers have reported an increase in engagement and motivation in PE lessons as well as other lessons across the curriculum. This year, we have had a higher rate of involvement from SEN children with a range of needs who previously have not taken part in PE lessons. Being a member of the Chiltern League has built self-esteem and confidence levels for many pupils as well as learning how to be resilient.
